Section 6.5. outlines the guidance for the safe and secure handling of medicines. This includes the action to take if the administration instructions on the dispensed medicine(s) differs from the instructions written on the current authority to administer documentation. General practice templates are available to facilitate the generation of prescriptions with generic administration instructions. These enable medicines to be administered via subcutaneous bolus injection or continuous subcutaneous infusion. Medicines should be administered in accordance with the current authority to administer documentation.

A range of patient information leaflets have been produced on medications that are used within palliative care, see Scottish Palliative Care Guidelines.

The Scottish Palliative Care Guidelines include colour coding for the status of medicines:

Red – For medicines normally initiated and used under specialist guidance*

Amber – For medicines normally initiated by a specialist but may be used by generalists*

Green – For medicines routinely initiated and used by generalists

*These classifications differ slightly from that within the Tayside Area Formulary traffic light status for medicines:
